Common Counsel Foundation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Efforts that support emergent strategies that help communities resist in rapidly changing conditions (e.g. immigration raids, hate crimes, media attacks, regressive policy proposals, etc.). This also includes resisting new or amplified threats; -Efforts to think strategically or coordinate between groups to build power and move a proactive community defined agenda; -Organizations that most clearly demonstrate a membership-led, community-organizing model that is working toward social, racial, economic or environmental policy change in disadvantaged communities through collective action; -Organizations that operate with a clear racial justice and intersectional framework; -Organizations that have a strong group of leaders and board members that represent the community they serve and who are accountable to the community; -Organizations that have strong leadership development programs for their members, and also have a concrete plan to grow and to build more power by getting more people involved; -Organizations that operate in deep alliance with and whose agenda is rooted in an agenda defined by base-building organizations; -Movement-building actions such as convenings, coalition- and base-building, communications, capacity-building, trainings or similar tactics to respond to or move a proactive agenda in rapidly changing conditions; -Organizations working in "hard to fund" areas, including the southern US, the "rust belt" and Rocky Mountain States; -Organizations that have IRS 501(c)3 tax exempt status or a fiscal sponsor who does. 	http://www.commoncounsel.org/still-we-rise-fund/					
Emergent Fund	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Efforts that support emergent strategies that help communities respond to rapidly changing conditions. This includes resisting new or amplified threats and building power to move a proactive agenda. -Efforts seeking long-term social justice and economic justice in a political and social climate that seeks to dismantle such efforts. 	https://www.emergentfund.net/apply

Fund for Southern Communities	<p>The Fund for Southern Communities (North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Gives grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000. -Provides seed grants to new projects, or general or project support to small organizations (with a total organizational budget of \$150,000 or less). -Limits funding to once per 12 month period and for no more than three (3) times total, per organization. When special targeted funds are available, groups may be eligible for more than three (3) cycles of grants. Groundswell Fund	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> -A strategic organizing response to a Public attack or a Community crisis. -A strategic organizing response to advance solidarity and coordination of organizations working across issues to defend the most vulnerable communities. -A strategic organizing response to an unforeseen legislative or policy development. -A strategic organizing response to a new Opportunity that is immediate, has a specific time frame, and is aligned with Groundswell Fund's approach and priorities. -A short-term project or action that creates opportunities to organize and build coalitions and/or educate Public officials or the general public. 	https://groundswellfund.org/rapid-response-fund/					

Hawaii People's Fund	<p>Hawai'i People's Fund's Urgent Action Grants support grassroots, social justice organizations in Hawai'i facing unforeseen, urgent threats, critical junctures in organizing, breaking opportunities or shifts in political landscape, that critically affect their organization and constituency. This fund is intended to help organizations achieve a timely and specific outcome or impact within 3-6 months, usually as part of a long term goal to achieve systems-based change. Requests are up to \$1,000 per fiscal year.</p> <p>Priority will be given to grants that support nonviolent direct action: the strategic use of immediately effective acts to achieve a political or social goal and challenge an unjust power dynamic or system. Resist	<p>Resist offers \$1,000 Rapid Response grants to better meet the needs of frontline groups and organizations. This grant is decided on by Resist staff and generally has a one week turn around.</p> <p>Resist offers Rapid Response Grants for groups and organizations to:</p> <p>Imagine and Build: for groups seeking financial support with training, consultation, healing, cultural work, conflict resolution, and/or restructuring. Examples include (but are not limited to): developing organizing skills, exploration of new strategies, community-led arts and culture work, board and staff development, fundraising support, and training, computer, and software training, transformative and strategic planning.</p> <p>Resist and Respond: for groups seeking to respond to unforeseen and timely political opportunities with organizing and/or cultural interventions. Examples include (but are not limited to) organizing direct action, creative resistance, and travel to protests in response to a call to action.</p>	http://resist.org/grants/programs					
San Francisco Foundation	<p>-Timely and urgent: Your organization must be responding to an unanticipated catalyzing event or urgent external challenge.</p> <p>-Opportunity for immediate impact: The project is strategic with a clear timeline and goals, with the desired outcomes having the potential to positively affect the community right away.</p> <p>-Clear focus on racial and/or economic equity: Your project specifically addresses racial and/or economic inequities. It should demonstrate a clear equity framework, explicitly responding to the unique needs, challenges, and strengths of marginalized communities.</p> <p>-Movement- and power-building: The project must aim to build the voice and power of people of color or other marginalized communities.</p> <p>-Representative leadership and staff: The project must be led by those who are most impacted by the racial and economic inequities that the effort aims to address (e.g. communities of color, immigrants, refugees, formerly incarcerated residents, youth, low-wage workers, people with disabilities, low-income residents, LGBTQ community members, etc.).</p> <p>Priority will be given to:</p> <p>-Requests from small organizations (budgets of \$500,000 or less) and new grassroots efforts, including faith-based groups and fiscally sponsored projects.</p> <p>-Projects that partner with other local organizations and community leaders who are doing complementary work.</p>	https://sff.org/what-we-do/funding/rrf/

<p>Third Wave Fund</p>	<p>-Youth Leadership: Young women of color and/or trans, gender non-conforming, intersex activists, and/or queer youth under 35 are a core part of planning and decision-making processes. Campaigns, efforts, or organizations are led by and for communities impacted by the event or situation you're responding to.</p> <p>-Gender Justice Focus: Your political analysis and project show how the issue(s) you're responding to address or are connected to patriarchy, transphobia, homophobia, gender inequity, or gender-based violence.</p> <p>-Gender Justice activism includes racial justice, economic justice, immigration justice, reproductive justice, health & HIV/AIDS justice, trans/intersex/queer justice, disability justice, healing justice, anti-violence and/or anti-criminalization work.</p> <p>-Community Power Building: Your proposal's strategies and activities help build power for youth-led gender justice activism, organizing, and/or healing in your communities, and are connected to the goal(s), outcome(s), and/or changes you want as a result of your proposed actions.</p> <p>-Urgency or Time-Sensitivity: The event or situation you're responding to was unanticipated, requires urgent or timely action, and/or leverages recent attention or media coverage.</p> <p>-Organizational Need: We will prioritize organizations with budgets under \$500,000 and that are based in areas with limited access to philanthropic resources.</p>	<p>http://www.thirdwavefund.org/mobilize-power-fund.html</p>			
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
